<b>Aims/ Objectives</b>	The aim of this seminar is to provide participants with a comprehensive understanding of the relationship between artificial intelligence (AI) and hate speech in digital environments. Through an interdisciplinary approach, participants will explore how AI systems influence, detect, moderate, and sometimes amplify harmful online discourse. The seminar seeks to increase awareness of the ethical, legal, social, and technological challenges associated with governing online communication, while fostering critical thinking about the opportunities and limitations of AI-driven solutions.
<b>Who should attend</b>	The seminar is designed for professionals working in communication, policy, digital media, education, and related fields who are interested in understanding the societal impact of AI-driven systems.
<b>Course content</b>	This seminar offers an interdisciplinary introduction to the relationship between artificial intelligence (AI) and hate speech in digital environments. It explores how AI technologies shape, detect, and sometimes reproduce harmful online discourse across social media and digital platforms. Participants will engage with technical, ethical, legal, and socio-cultural perspectives to better understand the challenges of governing online speech in the age of automation.
<b>Course Outcomes</b>	By the end of the seminar, participants will be able to critically assess the role of AI in shaping online communication and recognize the complexities involved in identifying and addressing hate speech. They will gain practical insights into the ethical and regulatory implications of AI technologies and develop a stronger understanding of how these issues affect their professional contexts. Participants will be equipped to apply this knowledge in their work by promoting responsible digital communication practices, evaluating AI-based moderation tools more effectively, and contributing to more inclusive and respectful online environments.
